Letter from Interim Dean Rider

On behalf of the faculty and staff of the College of Humanities, Arts, Behavioral and Social Sciences, I am honored to congratulate all of the Honors Graduates for the Class of 2016. I know that your family, friends, faculty and Dean are very proud of your accomplishments this day. Your dedication to your education, the work expended and sacrifices made are coming to fruition. Your successes, though, are just beginning.

You all have achieved success by graduating with honors, but each of you has a unique and special story to tell in how you achieved it; a story for which you should be proud. There are multiple paths to success. Your cohort is a rich blend of these wonderful success stories. Take from us not only the knowledge and skills that we have taught you but also life lessons on what it takes to be successful. Dedication. Discipline. I always tell my students that the difference between those individuals who are successful and those who are not, is not the absence of error but the presence of mind to learn from mistakes and adapt and grow.

Petrona Gregorio Psychology

The Dean's Office is delighted and honored to announce the College of Humanities, Arts, Behavioral, and Social Sciences Dean's Award winner for 2016, Petrona Gregorio-Pascual. Petrona is an outstanding Psychology student whose persistence, commitment, passion, and achievements exemplify the values, mission, and promise that our College has made to students.

Petrona was born in Aldea Ixnanconop in Guatemala. Her parents brought her to the United States at the age of five years, in search of an education and to have a better life. When she was enrolled at school at the age of seven



years she had to learn Spanish and English since her first language is Q'anjob'al (Mayan language), and was promoted to all English courses in the fourth grade. Upon finishing high school, she went into the workforce in order to help support her family.

After several years later, she got married and her husband Mario supported her decision to returning to get an education. After completing her general education units at Palomar Community College, she transferred to California State San Marcos (CSUSM). At CSUSM she met her mentor (now her advisor) Dr. Heike I. M. Mahler and applied to work in Dr. Mahler's social and health laboratory. Dr. Mahler has been critical to Petrona's academic success.

Another important factor to her academic success was being selected into the RISE program in Fall 2014. This program has been vital into preparing her for graduate school. She is the oldest of eight children; out of the eight, the first five are acquiring a higher education from different universities including UCSD, UCI, CSUSM, and Palomar College. Petrona is the first in her family to pursue a graduate level degree. In Fall 2016, she will continue her education as a graduate student in the Master's Degree Program in Experimental Psychology at CSUSM.

Faculty Keynote Speaker

Kristine Diekman

School of Arts Professor, Arts and Technology Director of Video in the Community

Ms. Kristine Diekman, Professor of Arts and Technology in the School of Art, joined California State University San Marcos in 1997. She also serves as Director of Video in the Community, and previously served as Program Director, Arts and Technology, and Chair, Visual and Performing Arts Department. Professor Diekman earned her MFA from the Rhode Island School of Design in Sculpture and her Bachelor of Special Studies from Cornell College in Chinese Studies. She graduated Summa Cum Laude and is recipient of the Phi Beta Kappa award



A media artist and leader of collaborative vision and social change, Professor Diekman has more than 30 years of experience producing, directing and editing award-winning films and media projects. These include experimental and documentary projects that focus on stories that may go unheard.

In 2016, Professor Diekman and her colleague were awarded a W.M. Keck Foundation Undergraduate Education Program grant of \$250,000 for the creation of the American Indian Digital Media and Culture Project, which incorporates American Indian epistemology in digital media projects that serve Southern California tribes and university students.

In 2016, Professor Diekman was awarded the prestigious CSU Wang Family Excellence Award. The Wang Family Excellence Award recognizes and celebrates four outstanding CSU faculty members and one outstanding staff member who, through extraordinary commitment and dedication, have distinguished themselves by exemplary contributions to the CSU.

Her signature program, Video in the Community, was founded in 2007 to engage students, faculty and the community in the collaborative process of creating media for social change. Through Video in the Community, she, along with students and community partners, completed more than 50 films and videos that serve non-profit organizations. Her current project, Run Dry, documents the stories of the California drought, focusing on people who are living in the Central Valley without water.

"The films that I make with students, other artists and community members are tools that advance our community's self-sufficiency. They are a call to action, a re-imagining of social connections, and a means to create social change. Video in the Community is about listening to and supporting unheard voices, providing a place from which they can speak and be heard." – Kristine Diekman
